Celebration of the Feast of the "Madonna della Libera", Pratola Peligna, May 3

Renato Frappi (It) writes: "Due to the Covid-19 lockdown, the 2020 celebration of the "Festa della Madonna della Libera in Pratola Peligna" was held behind closed doors. Only part of the religious programme could be organised. The celebration was held without the usual crowds of pilgrims filling the streets.

Yet its success was enormous among the faithful thanks to the hard work of the television crews and to the social media platforms which allowed us to broadcast the event all over the globe. Five satellite channels including the diocesan TV channel, "Onda TV Sulmona", and all the parish's Facebook pages, broadcast the solemn celebration on Saturday (2 May).

It was followed by the faithful not only in Italy but also in France, Belgium, Venezuela, Canada, the United States and other countries where people originally from Pratola, now live. Viewers numbered over forty thousand. After the recitation of the Rosary, everyone was able to follow the *"Esposizione della Madonna"*, the moment when the statue of the Virgin moves forward towards the faithful by means of a mechanical device and is then greeted by the assembly.





We will have to wait until next year to witness again the impressive entry into the Basilica of the pilgrims from Gioia dei Marsi, who walk all the way from their town to Pratola and enter the church on their knees. Our Bishop, Michele Fusco, and the many concelebrants, led by myself as parish priest, invoked Mary's help to rid the world of the virus that has dramatically affected almost the whole planet."

SANDWICH SERVICE AT NOTRE DAME DE FRANCE DURING LOCKDOWN, LONDON

Ivan Vodopivec (Eng) writes: "On March 14th the routine of our sandwich service for the homeless all but stopped. The lockdown was introduced and naturally, due to social distancing measures our drop-in centre was not able to welcome our guests safely. Westminster council (municipal authorities) swung into action and along with initiatives similar to our own, began to work out how we can serve the most vulnerable people in our city in a safe way. Although accommodation had been found for over 400 people almost instantly, there was still the need to get food to those on the streets.

It was decided that our sandwich service would provide some food on Friday and Saturday evenings and on Saturdays at noon. We welcome on average between 80-100 guests at every service. I find it humbling to see our visitors queuing, respecting the social distancing rules, waiting patiently and quietly (some not so quietly perhaps!) and having received their food, leaving with a heartfelt 'thank you'.

Our guests have taught me to appreciate and value what I have and how rich my life is because of the people who are part of it. One of our volunteers, Cosme, put it well when he said, '...certainly, the sandwich service is ostensibly about food (people are hungry) but it is also about an encounter, a link, a connection, a means to relate to the vulnerable'. So, when I see the exchange of smiles, the humour and laughter between our volunteers and guests, what might be seen as ordinary becomes extraordinary and, in that encounter, I see the face of the living God."
