43 YEARS OF MARIST PILGRIMAGES

Our confrere Michael Coleman (Eng) has been leading pilgrimages from England to Lourdes and several other places and shrines for the last 43 years.

He writes:" I have no precise idea of the number of people who have travelled but I think that it has to be more than 8,000. We must have been to Lourdes over 40 times and to Rome twenty times. In Assisi, we were caught up in the earthquake which

destroyed the city. The shrine to Padre Pio proved to be a wonderful experience on two occasions. A pilgrimage to Fatima and Compostela was an occasion of peace and joy and proved very popular.

One particularly noteworthy pilgrim who travelled with us was an Anglican Bishop. He joined us on a number of occasions with some of his relatives. Czestochowa, the Marian Shrine of Poland, too was

much appreciated. The birth place of Pope John Paul II added a perspective as did the visit to the horrors of the concentration camp in Auschwitz.

The Holy Land has been a destination on five occasions, which gives us a deeper understanding of Mary, Our Mother, and Her special role.

The pilgrimages to our Marist places of origins were always popular and people showed greatest interest in these places which so influenced the foundation of the Society of Mary."

In 2018, Joaquin finished his mandate as provincial bursar in Paris and joined the Marist international novitiate formation team in Davao.

He writes: "It has been a little over a year and a half since I arrived in the Philippines. The change from Paris to Davao was quite radical but I was not going to spend a month in my new home thinking of going back! Everything is different: the land, climate, house, food, clothing, people, customs. Thank God my body responded well and my spirit too.

The group of novices who arrived a week later was very varied and international. They were 10 young men between 19 and 34 years of age, coming from 4 continents and 6 different nationalities. My involvement in the program is in the area of Spiritual Life and Consecrated Life. These topics are rich and varied... The important thing is to offer the novices the elements that will allow them to discern their vocation.

I consider it a privilege and a grace to be at the service of the mission of the Society of Mary in the formation of its members in the novitiate. Being in contact with young people and future Marists, helps me to see Marist life from another perspective which instils hope. The results are never guaranteed of course. Declan Marmion is a native of Dublin and was ordained as a Marist priest in 1988. He has been working in field of theology for over 20 years in the Milltown Institute of Philosophy and Theology in Dublin and since 2010 at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, Ireland. He serves as Dean of the Faculty and Professor of Systematic Theology. St Patrick's College is the Irish National Seminary and a Pontifical University with about 200 undergraduate students and 50 postgraduate students at Masters, Licentiate and Doctorate levels.

Declan's work comprises: academic administration, undergraduate and postgraduate teaching, research supervision and writing. He is also the editor of the Irish Theological Quarterly, an international peer-review journal: (bit.ly/IrishTheoQly); and co-editor of the series, Theology, Society and Culture with Peter Lang (bit.ly/PeterLangStudies) - 14 volumes published to date.
